Faith is all too often proclaimed with almost certainty that it is real and fully functional in our lives. It often appears that once we have announced to the world that we are men and women, boys and girls of Faith, the road to either recovery or assurance is clear and without pot-holes, steep curves, or certainly no sudden road blocks. Faith coupled with Hope, we are

prone to conclude, is all that we need. Certainly, we say, the Lord recognizes our Faith and Hope and will protect us from the ravages of everyday troubles and trauma. Why would He not take care of his own? Save them from troubles and disappointments!

The scriptures do not support such a “pie in the sky” characterization of the function of Faith in a world committed to discrediting the Love and Mercy of God and His Heavenly Host. In fact, the Lord through His Permissive Will, challenges us daily, and often more frequently, to validate our Faith as real and not just on the surface. Often the challenge comes in small doses; yet, other challenges come in heavy doses that tend to create havoc within our lives. It might involve the illness or even death of a family member; sometimes it might involve the stability of a marriage; sometimes it might involve the wayward behavior of a child or grandchild; sometimes it might involve an accusation of which you know that you are not guilty; sometimes it might involve a broken relationship even in church. In each of these instances, the Christian Bible, through its scriptures, provides clear examples of how Faith and dependence upon the Lord deepened the spiritual core of men and women, boys and girls throughout history. Very often, these examples presented saints, who while under great stress and challenges, experienced moments when their Faith faltered before it was deepened. Such is the case today when the Lord permits us to lose our comfort in this world as a means of gaining greater Faith in Him as being sufficient to bring peace from even chaos.

When the Lord spoke of the Christian as “the salt of the earth,” He declared us as a curative element whose purpose it is to combat ruin and decay in our homes, in our communities, in our places of

work, in our places of play, in our schools, as well as in our places of worship. If the meat is exposed too long to the contaminating agents, it is almost certain that the meat will, in due time, spoil and be cast away. Such is true with our children and youth, along with adults, whose lives are not touched by the power of Christian Faith in the Lord. We are tremendously blessed to have a number of people who do a lot of different things, basically when nobody is around. Two such people are Brother Edmond and Sister Frances Cook. It really is no telling what time of day or night that they are working here at the church just to make sure that our church home is appropriately prepared for all worshippers.

Frances is a member of the Church Council, Inspirational Choir, WMU and Sunday Morning Bible Study. She enjoys Bible Study immensely. She says that learning about God's truth and living His truth is a lifelong process, for it continues to deepen her faith and love for God. Frances is quite dutiful in preparation for our services that comes from our kitchen. Her challenge and enjoyment of managing food service at CFBC are that it allows members to come to the table, to break bread, fellowship and celebrate God's bounty. Whether it is preparing for our fellowship meal or other occasions when food has to be served, she is always on the job trying her very best to have a quality food service program. Frances is a native of Fort Gaines, Georgia and received her Bachelors of Science Degree in Food Management from Tuskegee Institute, now known as Tuskegee University, and her Master's Degree in Food and Nutrition from New York University.

During her career as a registered dietitian nutritionist, Frances served for thirty-four years in public health. As Director of the Office of Nutrition at the Georgia Department of Public Health, Frances worked with various groups and organizations to develop and implement a statewide public health system that provided nutrition information and services to citizens within Georgia's nineteen public health districts. One of the highlights of Frances' career occurred in 1991 when the Accreditation Council for Education in Nutrition and Dietetics granted approval for an accredited community-based dietetic internship in the Office of Nutrition at the Georgia Department of Health, making Georgia the second state (following Virginia) to have an accredited internship in a state public health agency. Retiring in 2007, Frances was proud of the fact that one hundred fifty employees (public health nutritionists) had completed the dietetic internship.

Our dear Brother Edmond is from Waverly Hall, Georgia. Edmond is a member of the Building and Grounds Committee. He is one of those persons who we would say is a Jack-of-All-Trades. He definitely knows something about every aspect of a facility and the requirements to have it operate successfully. Whether it is plumbing or electrical, Edmond has a pretty good idea of how to get things fixed. If he doesn't know, you can be well assured that he knows someone who does. In Celebration of African American History Month

Spurred by growing racial violence in the early twentieth century, and particularly by race riots in Springfield Illinois in 1908, a group of African American leaders joined together to form a new permanent civil rights organization, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP). February 12, 1909 was chosen because it was the centennial anniversary of the birth of Abraham Lincoln. Black History Month began as “Negro History Week,” which was created in 1926 by Carter G. Woodson, a noted African American historian, scholar, educator, and publisher. It became a month-long celebration in 1976. The month of February was chosen to coincide with the birthdays of Frederick Douglass and Abraham Lincoln. Today, Black History Month honors the contributions of African Americans to United States history.

Did you know that:

- **Madam C.J. Walker** was America’s first self-made woman to become a millionaire.
- **Jack Johnson** became the first African-American man to hold the World Heavyweight Champion boxing title in 1908. He held on to the belt until 1915.
- **John Mercer Langston** was the first black man to become a lawyer in Ohio when he passed the Bar in 1854. When he was elected to the post of Town Clerk for Brownhelm, Ohio in 1855 Langston became one of the first African Americans ever elected to public office in America. John Mercer Langston was also the great-uncle of **Langston Hughes**, famed poet of the Harlem Renaissance.
- **Thurgood Marshall** was the first African American ever appointed to the United States Supreme Court. He was appointed by President Lyndon B. Johnson and served on the Supreme Court from 1967 to 1991.
- **George Washington Carver** developed 300 derivative products from peanuts among them cheese, milk, coffee, flour, ink, dyes, plastics, wood stains, soap, linoleum, medicinal oils and cosmetics.
- **Hiram Rhodes Revels** was the first African American ever elected to the United States Senate. He represented the state of Mississippi from February 1870 to March 1871.
- **Shirley Chisholm** was the first African American woman elected to the House of Representatives. She was elected in 1968 and represented the state of New York. She broke ground again four years later in 1972 when she was the first major party African-American candidate and the first female candidate for president of the United States.
- **Hattie McDaniel** was the first African American performer to win an Academy Award (the film industry’s highest honor) for her portrayal of a loyal slave governess in *Gone With the Wind*.
- **Dr. Mae Jemison** became the first African American woman to go into space aboard the space shuttle, Endeavor. During her eight-day mission, she worked with U.S. and Japanese researchers and was a co-investigator on a bone cell experiment.
- **Barack Obama** served as the first African American President of the United States from 2008 to 2016.
- The black population of the United States in 1870 was 4.8 million; in 2007, the number of black residents of the United States, including those of more than one race, was 40.7 million.


